FARM FAIR SHOW

The theme for this years' Orchids in Paradise show is "Tutu's Play Yard".

We are looking for greenery to be included as filler in the display. Cuttings that will last in the heat of the summer are best, like Norfolk Pine or Star of India. Also looking for donations of a battery operated power drill and an electrical extension cord. So if you have an extra one, let Pearl or Stacie know.

GIOS and our member plant vendors, will be selling plants. These are typically very nicely priced so shop early to get the best selection! The **public** fair hours are:

Thursday, 8/24, 6 pm to midnight	Friday, 8/25, 6 pm to midnight
Saturday, 8/26, Noon to midnight	Sunday, 8/27, Noon to 11 pm.

GIOS display set up is on Wednesday, 8/23. Volunteer sign-ups will be done at the August 11th meeting. Elizabeth Borchelt, the Show Chair, and Pearl Wollin, the Display Co-Chair, will be available at the sign-ups to assist. **Check the sign-up sheets for the exact times.** We will be staggering some of the start times to better facilitate the setup. Fair entry and parking passes will be passed out at that time also. Volunteers will be needed for: plant sales, display set-up, security during the show, and display cleanup. If you are not able to be at the meeting to sign-up, either have someone else sign you up at meeting who will be there or contact Nancy Nakama.

Water, snacks, and dinner will be provided for set-up volunteers. Judging will take place Thursday morning at 8 am. Tear down of the display will start on Sunday at 2:00 pm. If you are not working on the tear down, please make sure you pick up your plants at 2 or arrange with someone to move them out of the display.

Start prepping your plants now. There are some tips on Page 6 we have previously received from Scot Mitamura for prepping our plants (check out the 2016 July August Newsletter on the web site for the whole article).

Plants should be delivered NO later than 4:00 pm to the display for placement. This includes having the plant name tags already attached. If you need help on getting your plants to the display, contact one of the Officers or Show Display Chairs.

Plant names for tags should be given to Karen Harlow at the August 11th general meeting or send an e-mail (harlows@hawaii.rr.com) or USPS Mail (PO Box 597, Kalaheo 96741) to arrive no later than **Sunday, August 20th.** Laminated tags will be available for pickup on Wednesday, August 23th at set-up. Please provide any names for plants you think might be ready since the display looks more professional if we do not have hand-written tags. Names should include the plant owner's name, the plant Genus and the given name or species name. An example would be Epi Pacific Sunset. If the plant name has been lost, include the Genus (i.e. Epi). Sometimes, one of our orchid experts will be able to figure out the name based on what the plant looks like and where you obtained it.

VOLUNTEERING FOR OFFICERS & CHAIRS

The term for our existing officers and chair persons ends in December 2017. The Board will review the slate in September and upon approval, the slate will be posted in the October newsletter with elections to be held at the October meeting. Below are the Chair positions that currently **do not** have a volunteer identified and are **available** for your consideration (detailed description available from the By Laws Chair):

- Photographer: Responsible for the official GIOS photographs. This includes: taking pictures at all general meetings, club functions and all first place winners for both shows for the newsletter.
- Newsletter: Responsible for creating/publishing the GIOS Newsletter 6 times a year and maintaining the GIOS website.
- Show Display: Responsible for the display at the Spring and Fall Show. This includes: Design the display in accordance with the show theme, coordinate with a nursery, if trees and or ferns need to be rented; Plan out a list of props and supplies needed and assure that everything will be available and ready to assemble at the show site on the designated set-up day; Provide direction to set up and clean up volunteers.
- Makana: Manage a reward program to assist the club in recruiting officers, chairpersons and workers. This includes: conduct sign-ups for members to fill work shifts at shows; provide show volunteer duties to members during sign-ups; maintain a list of members and points earned; and at the December meeting, conduct the reward program, by providing various items for members to redeem their points.
- By-Laws: Maintaining a list of club policies and procedures as well as the by-laws of the Society. During an election year, the chairperson will seek out candidates for each office and at the same time, solicit the membership for volunteers to fill chairperson positions for all standing committees.
- Publicity: Responsible for all club publicity. This includes: notifying news media of upcoming meetings and or activities of the club; providing publicity updates to the Newsletter Chair to include in newsletter and or GIOS website; maintaining a publication list; and providing publicity for the GIOS Spring and Fall Shows.
- Craft Sales: Plan and maintain an inventory of items to be sold to generate revenues for the club. This includes: obtaining assistance from members and provide direction on creating assigned craft items; and managing the craft booth at Spring Show.

SANTA BARBARA TRIP BY KAREN HARLOW

A few people have positively responded to my e-mail requesting interest in going to next year's Annual Santa Barbara International Orchid Show. If you are interested, please let me know. The show is March 9th—11th at the Earl Warren Showgrounds.

Show Highlights from their website:

- Fabulous displays of exotic orchid species and hybrids installed by exhibitors from around the world
- Thousands of blooming orchid plants, as well as art work and orchid supplies for sale
- Juried exhibition of orchid-themed fine art and photography
- Free workshops on orchid care led by orchid experts
- Unique flower arrangement exhibition

The show is still quite a ways down the road, but hotel rooms in the area book up pretty quickly. I have already seen the prices change just within the last month. I have done some preliminary look at costs that are identified below. Everyone will be responsible for booking their own airfare and hotel. We can pool ground transportation based on the number of people that want to participate. If you want to take advantage of the carpooling, we need to make sure we all arrive about the same time to LAX. If you are strongly interested, you should **book your hotel immediately**. If you book thru Expedia, you should be able to get a free cancellation (until a few days before the show), just check the fine print. Be thinking about whether or not you want to share a room with someone.

Costs:

Airfare – From Lihue to LAX is about \$600 (then a 2.5 hour drive to Santa Barbara); airfare Lihue to Santa Barbara about \$750; frequent flier miles on Hawaiian right now are 35,000 for round trip to LAX.

Hotel — Assuming a five night stay in Santa Barbara area, below are some available hotels:

- Best Western Beachside the average cost is \$200 a night (for two people) \$1000+taxes
- There are several hotels in the \$175-\$250 a night level
- Motel 6 (several) \$100-120/night + taxes

Car Rental Mini Van (7 people max) 380 = 55/person

Summarized Total Cost per person based on sharing hotel and car is around \$1330 (plus taxes). The tickets to the show range from \$12 to \$22, depending on length of pass and your age. The proposal for five nights in the area is because there are lots of things to do besides the orchid show. Below are some possibilities:

PREPARING PLANTS FOR THE SHOW

Quick tips on prepping before the show and when transporting to the show:

- When your orchids are flowering, keep water off the flowers to eliminate Botrytis or flower blight. Water also makes the flowers hang down. The flowers will get small brown dots. If you let that flower dry up and it falls on the ground, the botrytis can spread.
- Slugs: Check orchids at night. Scot uses slug bait regularly. Once you see damage, it's too late already. Any slug bait is fine (note from Karen Harlow-Sluggo is safe for pets). Sprinkle it roughly on top and a little bit on the ground, you don't need to over apply it. But do it consistently.
- Groom off dead leaves and sheaths. You can cut damage off the leaves (sterilize clippers first). On Cattleyas take off the white sheathing, it can harbor scales. If the scales are really bad, put it on the ground and hit it with a high pressure hose. Any kind of horticultural oil will kill it, if need be.
- Make sure your orchids are free of pests, diseases and weeds. Do not Share with others (slugs sleep in the day and they come out at night).
- Stake all your plants. When transporting, secure them in a heavier pot and then in a box or tray.
- How to prolong flower bloom or hasten the bloom? Put it in more light to hasten and put in shade to prolong!
