AMERICAN ORCHID SOCIETY (AOS)

The American Orchid Society (AOS) website has a wealth of information available to the public.

There is one section called "All About Orchids". The sub-categories are Orchid Basics, AOS Culture Sheets, Monthly Checklists, Orchids A to Z, Pests & Diseases, AOS Video Library and Additional Orchid Resources.

Culture Sheets—If you want to learn more about specific types of orchids, there are over 20 Culture Sheets available for viewing on-line or printing. They also have 13 of these available in 22 different languages including Chinese, Filipino, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, and Thai.

Each of the culture sheets include information about the needs (light, temperatures, water, humidity, fertilizing, and potting) for the type of orchid.

AOS Video Library—There are "how to" videos for lots of things — like removing a keiki and when to repot.

Take some time to explore it!

PREPARING ORCHIDS FOR THE SHOW

Excerpts taken from Scot Mitamuri's presentation notes 2012 May June Newsletter:

Basics of staking and grooming. You need to make sure when you bring an orchid to a show that there are no slugs or any other bugs. Using a simple spray of rubbing alcohol will kill whatever your plant may have. Check for ants. 99% of the time if you have ants it is because your plant needs to be repotted. The medium breaks down and ants make a nest inside.

Sterilize your tools first. Cut off leaves that may be old or spotted. Take flowers off if there are spots on them because it will affect the new flowers in bud. Cut it so it is visually nice, don't do it too close and catch the leaf by mistake. Take out any weeds; you don't want to spread them to someone else's orchid.

Stake the plant early. Cut the stake at the bottom at an angle to help it grab. When staking the plant put the stake against the plant. Anywhere else it will create a spoon affect. Put it right against the plant and if a root gets broken it is no big deal. Countersink stake to balance it out. We don't want the stake poking an eye out so it shouldn't be any higher than the leaves of the plant. You can use electrical wire or twist ties. Wrap the ties around two or three times and then twist it. That way it won't move up and down. Double wrap it, twist it, and try to get all the leaves together. Lift the lower leaves up, gather all together. It is critical for big flowers that you move the foliage away from the flowers; that way they don't get interrupted by leaves and gives them space to open up. Stake the plant early, let flowers open down, and then in three to four days when they are hard stake it up.

You can cut off some of the leaves if it helps to show the flowers better. Tidy things up and keep the leaves away from the flowers. Sometimes it just needs a little support. Accentuate the natural beauty. You want the flowers facing the audience. The newsletter has tips for every kind of orchid, below is the notes for Paphelidium (lady slippers)

Lady slippers. It will take about a week for the flower neck to harden. Right before the show you want to bring it up. If it is not ready and the show is here, you can still fix it. Normally leave alone and let it open for a week, then stake it. Put a small v under the neck. Do I break flowers? Yeah a lot. If you work on staking them early, you're less likely to break the flowers.

SPRING SHOW

Plant Name Tags: Those bringing plants to display should provide a list to Karen Harlow by April 3rd (Monday) either thru email harlows@hawaii.rr.com or USPS mail PO Box 597 Kalaheo 96741. Provide the complete name of the plant and the owner's name (as you wish it to appear on the label). If you don't have the name of the plant (tag has been lost), just identify the type of orchid—like a Dendrobium. If you are using a saved tag from a previous year and there is no "extra" slip of paper still attached to the laminated tag, let Karen know so she can make up the "extra" tag to adhere. The judges use these when putting together the master list of award winners.

All Display plants must arrive between 2:00 PM and 4:00 PM on Thursday afternoon to allow the display

team to finalize the display. Your name tags will be available at set-up to attach to your plants before putting into the display.

We will be providing dinner for the volunteers on Thursday after set-up.

We only have 49 cookbooks left, so be sure to pick yours up early at the Spring Show if you want one!
