Learning Center with Al Sugano: Re-potting

As a preview to the hands-on re-potting session later in the meeting, Al offered the following advice and suggestions when it comes to re-potting orchids. Al first encouraged us to be a gardener to our orchids, not just an owner, being more watchful, more protective, and more caring of our orchids.

Re-potting reenergizes the orchid. The timing of repotting is critical to the overall health of the plant.

The best time to re-pot is when there is new growth and short new roots. You should avoid cutting these new roots. If you wait too long to re-pot, the plant will struggle more which may delay blooming.

The first step to re-potting is to know when to re-pot. There are two main reasons to re-pot: when the plant is too big for its pot, or when the media it is in decomposes. A key sign that a plant is too big for its pot is when the pseudobulb has grown over the edge of the pot. To determine if the media has decomposed too far, look below the top layer of media to a depth of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches to see if the media is firm. If it is soft, it is time to re-pot.

Know which direction you are going with the plant. Typically orchids grow directionally with new growth coming from the more recent growth. Most orchids can be re-potted in the same container or a pot of the same size by removing the old growth. Other orchids can be divided into two plants and potted in the same size or smaller pots. The rule for dividing is to preserve a minimum of three viable pseudobulbs in each new plant.

The re-potting process itself is straight forward:

- a. Carefully remove the orchid from its pot
- b. Carefully remove the old media from the plant and its roots
- c. Keep 3 to 4 bulbs and remove the remainder of the old growth
- d. Peel off the sheath from the bulbs
- e. Put a layer of media in the bottom of the pot
- f. Place the orchid on the media centered in the pot
- g. Top off with more media so that the media hold the plant in place

Orchids will need time to acclimate and adjust to their new pot and new environment, some times they may not bloom in the coming year because of this. If you are working with species rather than hybrids, do not submerge them in bark.
