

New Business:

Orchiata Bark Giveaway – Kauai Irrigation Supply kindly donated one bag of bark to be raffled off during the meeting. Kimberlee Kain was the lucky winner of the bark,

commenting that she had lots of re-potting to do! **Quick update:** A few weeks later she had all of her repotting finished and used up all of the bark. Awesome work Kimberlee!

Next Meeting: Re-Potting Session

Re-potting is essential to the overall health of orchids. It provides the appropriate room and media needed for healthy growth and future blooming. Here are some critical points to determine when it's time for re-potting, and which orchid(s) to bring to our June re-potting session:



An overgrown orchid in need of re-potting

- Ideally when the plant is NOT in spike, nor in bloom
- Immediately AFTER blooming
- Newly purchased plant that is not in an ideal mix/media for that specific orchid, growing area, etc.
- Newly purchased plant is not in an appropriate pot for specific orchid, e.g., no airholes for proper air circulation
- New roots are emerging from the plant
- Signs of "soft" deteriorating potting mix/media
- Plant is too big for the pot; it needs to be either divided or put in a larger sized pot



It's also helpful for you and your orchid if the plant is watered well just prior to re-potting. There will likely be less damage to the roots, and it also makes it easier to remove the orchid from the current pot. Some of our members may not have plants ready to re-pot. So everyone is welcome to bring extra orchids for another member to practice re-potting on. GIOS will supply the new medium for your re-potting, bring your orchids, new pots, stakes, and any tools you might need.

Learning Center with Al Sugano



Al shared with the group some great ideas and suggestions at the April Meeting's Learning Center. Here is a summary of his talk.



Learning — Everyone is always learning, this is true of us in our journey with our orchids. Whether we are just beginners with orchids, or have some experience, or are experts or growers, we all have questions. And many of those questions are the same. Beginners have lots of questions about what to do and how to do it. Experienced growers may have more insight and experience, but they are still faced with something new and different on a regular basis. Embrace the learning experience and don't be afraid to ask questions! We are all happy to share.

Culture — Understanding and addressing an orchid's culture to critical to its happiness. By culture we mean the amount of light, fertilizer, water, medium and pot desired by the orchid. Different types of orchids have different needs and by understanding and filling these needs properly, we can be more successful growing happy and healthy orchids.



Of these elements of culture, only the pot is artificial and foreign to the plant. Pots do not occur in nature. Think about your orchid's pots as you would raising a child. A young orchid should have its roots confined to protect them and minimize root rot. A 1-2"

diameter pot is like a crib for this young orchid. As the orchid begins to outgrow its crib, it should be re-potted into a playpen, or a 2-3" diameter pot. Mature orchids move up to a queen size bed, a 4-5" pot



where the roots have room to grow. All recommended a pot with a raised bump inside in the bottom, about 1/3 the height of the pot, to suspend the roots and help prevent rot, as well as having slits in the pot for good drainage. Clear pots help the roots with photosynthesis.

Re-potting — Orchids should be re-potted when they begin to overgrow a side or sides of their pot, when they have new roots growing over the edges of the pot, and/or when the media is beginning to break down.



Favorites — Al likes growing orchids that are easy to bloom and bloom multiple times per year, such as Dendrobiums. He also likes mini Cattleyas because they divide easily. If a Cattleya is filling its pot, and there is new growth on both sides of the plant, split the plant in two when re-potting and soon you will have two beautiful blooming plants!



Diversity — Once you feel comfortable with the culture and care for the orchids you have, consider branching out with a new type of orchid and learn about its culture. Try an orchid that is compatible with your current environment first!
