Next Meeting: Orchids in Situ & How I Grow My Orchids

Dennis Olivas will show and discuss orchids growing in various climates and growing conditions in the wild. Then he will show his collection growing in an unheated greenhouse in Daly City and outside in Pleasant Hill.

Born on Kauai, as a lad Dennis helped his mom and aunt grow their orchids and got hooked. He joined the Future Farmers of America where his project was raising and selling these beautiful and exotic plants. In 1980 he moved to the mainland and swore off the orchid family; not for long though, as he was introduced to the Rod McLeallan's Acres of Orchids'. From there his whole life became an obsession. First he filled his home with upwards of 6,000 plants. Then he leased space for his burgeoning orchid collection, which soon overflowed the 3,000 sq. ft. greenhouse in Half Moon Bay. With the help of friends, he moved his obsession to a 3,000 sq. ft. greenhouse in Daly City in November of 2013. This presented a whole new ball game of learning how to raise orchids, still without heat, but in an area that gets more sun, higher temperatures, and

good water year round. Currently, Dennis rents a 5,500 sq. ft. unheated greenhouse space as his collection increases.

Dennis has been President of the Peninsula Orchid Society, San Francisco Orchid Society, Diablo View Orchid Society and the Santa Cruz Orchid Society. He is an accredited judge of the American Orchid Society for over 30 years. Dennis belongs to over 14 orchid societies and tries to assist them whenever possible. He travels throughout the United States to speak to numerous orchid societies and garden clubs, even traveling to Brazil to speak. Since 1988 he has been an orchid vendor, showing in up to twenty shows a year throughout California and Nevada.





Orchids 101 — James Keach



James made a shortened version of a presentation he has prepared and given to others titled <u>Orchids 101</u>. Following are a few slides and highlights from his presentation. To view the full presentation please click on the title above.






The orchid family has 25,000 to 30,000 species and can be found on every continent and most climates. They can be both terrestrial, growing on the ground, and epiphytic, growing on something else like a tree.

There are 3 orchids that are native to Hawaii: platanthera holochila (now endangered), anoectochilus sandvicensis, and liparia hawaiensis.

Orchid species and genius can all inter-combine, creating a huge number of hybrids. Primary hybrids are between two species while intergeneric hybrids can be between two and three genera. Orchid labels list the genius, species and clonal name. If the orchid is a cross of hybrids, the label with list the female parent first, followed by an X, then the male parent.





Each type of orchid prefers a different mix of culture to thrive, meaning its lighting, temperature, water and fertilizing needs should be understood and managed appropriately. Re-potting should be done roughly every 2-3 years.

At the left are general answers to the two questions James is most often asked.

Fun With Re-potting

Following James Keach's very informative Orchids 101 presentation, the group moved on to a re-potting session. Some members brought quite a few plants in that needed re-potting. There was lots of help and advice available and everyone walked away with happier orchids in fresh medium and sometimes larger pots.








It took a team to deal with this large overgrown orchid







meeting. Additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor at the October meeting but the nominees must be present or if absent, written consent provided before their nomination. If you have an interest in any position, contact Elizabeth Borchelt or another officer. Each position generates Makana points that can be redeemed at our December meeting.

Below are the Chair positions that currently do not have a volunteer identified and are available for your consideration, along with summary descriptions below. Detailed descriptions will be available at the August meeting.

* By-Laws * Publicity * Craft Sales * Audio/Visual

Secretary: Responsible to keep accurate minutes and attendance of Board members at all Board meetings; Maintain a society calendar; Conduct all official correspondence; Take minutes at all General Meetings.





* Refreshments

Membership: Maintain a list of member's names and contact information; Collect membership dues; Distribute and collect name tags at General Meetings.

Show Chair: Oversees all activities related to the Shows; Recruit Show team, assigns tasks, provides overall project management; Responsible for the Show from set up through tear down.





Show Judging: Responsible for recruiting and managing judges for all Shows; includes making travel arrangements and coordinating with photographer; compiles and distributes list of winners.

GIOS Board & Committee Positions (continued)



Show Display: Responsible for the display at the Shows. This includes: Design the display in accordance with the show theme, coordinate with a nursery, if trees and or ferns need to be rented; Plan out a list of props and supplies needed and assure that everything will be available and ready to assemble at the show site on the designated set-up day; Provide direction to set up and clean up volunteers.

Photographer: Responsible for the official GIOS photographs. This includes taking pictures at all general meetings, club functions and all first place winners at Shows for the newsletter.



Makana: Manage a reward program to assist the club in recruiting officers, chairpersons and workers. This includes: Conduct sign-ups for members to fill work shifts at Shows; Provide Show volunteer duties to members during sign-ups; Maintain a list of members and points earned; and at the December meeting, conduct the reward program, by providing various items for members to redeem their points.

By-Laws: Maintain a list of club policies and procedures as well as the by-laws of the Society. During an election year, the chairperson will seek out candidates for each office and at the same time, solicit the membership for volunteers to fill chairperson positions for all standing committees.



Publicity: Responsible for all club publicity. This includes: Notifying news media of upcoming meetings and or activities of the club; Providing publicity updates to the Newsletter Chair to include in newsletter and or GIOS website; Maintaining a publication list; and Providing publicity for the Shows.

Fundraising/Craft Sales: Plan and maintain an inventory of items to be sold to generate revenues for the club. This includes: Obtaining assistance from members and provide direction on creating items; and Managing the craft booth at Shows.



Bylaws



Audio/Visual: Responsible for maintaining and storing GIOS electronic equipment; Set up needed equipment in advance of meetings or presentations; collect electronic presentation material for presenter and GIOS use.
